We desperately need your help. As you are aware, "we" have a stray cat problem in Flagler County. Through some research and dedication, we have found an answer to "our" problem, unfortunately not a solution, which would place these animals in homes. Those of us who have tried, know how hard to impossible that is, though we are continuing to try.

In the past, Flagler Humane Society was forced to euthanize approximately 1,500 cats and spayed or neutered over 900. Obviously, the practices which have been used in the past are not working.

Flagler Humane Society has introduced a program called "FERALS 911". This is simply a trap-neuter-return program.

The FERALS 911 team of volunteers are trained and supervised by Flagler Humane Society. Their mission is to trap-neuter-return-manage feral cat colonies throughout Flagler County.



Through this program reproductive capacity and nuisance behavior are substantially reduced and the cats receive care while the colony is ultimately reduced, and feral cat over-population will no longer be a pressing issue for our community.



Phase I of Ferals 911 began on December 1, 2007. Flagler Humane Society will spay or neuter feral cats every Wednesday.

For \$35.00, we will spay/neuter, give pain injection, antibiotic injection, mandatory notch, and a rabies vaccination.

Cats must be at the Shelter on Wednesday mornings by 8:15 a.m. in a humane trap.



Certificates must be purchased in advance and are good for 30 days. Patrons are limited to 2 (two) certificates per week per person. Cash or credit only. Personal checks are *not* accepted.
